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

Your Beautiful Mind by Zoe Kozina

New Trier High School senior, Zoe Kozina, has lived with a learning disability. She wrote a children's book to highlight the struggles and triumphs of those with invisible disabilities. The story reflects her personal experience as a third grader diagnosed with a learning disability. Zoe couldn't understand why she was asked to leave her classroom to receive extra help. Her story follows Penelope the Panda, who like Zoe has been diagnosed with a learning disability. She too is pulled out for special instruction. Penelope meets a new friend, Emily the Elephant, who Penelope thinks is very smart and capable. One day, Penelope sees Emily in the resource room and realizes if Emily can be smart and capable, so can she.

The author created the story to help children understand what it means to have a learning disability. And she wanted to share her message not to define yourself by it. "Always remember that you can be whatever you want. That's your choice, not your disabilities' choice."





A Special Bond – Braves Super Star, Matt Olson, and Reece

When Reece Blankenship sees his friend Matt Olson, he'll hold his hand for a long while, rubbing his finger along the calluses that have formed from years of gripping a baseball bat. Matt's hands have long been a source of fascination for Reece, ever since the two became buddies in high school. "When I was growing up, I always had some sort of ball in my hand, always flipping it around," Olson says. "Reece was always amazed by my hand dexterity ... To him, my motor skills were amazing."

Reece has autism and is nonverbal. That didn't stop Matt from befriending Reece, his fellow classmate at Parkview High School in Lilburn, GA. The friendship continued after high school. When Matt was a Minor League player, his season was wrapping up just as Reece's siblings were venturing off to college. Matt, also a friend of Reece's sister Daron, was happy to step in to keep Reece company.

Soon thereafter, as Matt was becoming an MVP-caliber professional baseball player, Reece had a quantum leap in communication that caught everyone -- including Matt -- by surprise. Reece's parents took him to a communication workshop where individuals with autism are taught to point to letters on a board to spell words. He was able to express thoughts locked inside for nearly 20 years. What he had to say was nothing short of extraordinary.

Now, these pals are both using their hands to make an impact -- the 29-year-old Matt hitting homeruns, and the 28-year-old Reece with the letterboard he points to when spelling out his ideas to empower, accept and advocate for individuals with autism. This led Reece's family to create ReClif, a fitness-based therapy center and nonprofit to help individuals with autism and their families. With a trade that brought Olson to his hometown team last year, he has been able to increase his support of ReClif by organizing Diamond Casino Night, a major fundraiser, as well as The Matt Pack that provides Braves tickets to families.


When asked what his friendship with Matt means to him Reece used his letterboard to respond. "Realistically, friendships for those like me are unique and difficult. Matt and I forged our friendship during many hours shared together as he helped me work on developing motor skills. But my favorite times were spent walking for miles in companionable silence. Matt and I cannot chat on the phone easily, text, or share a beer in a loud sports bar like most guys. But Matt and I have connected on a different plane. I have said many times that our friendship transcends typical speech. We have an unspoken bond."

The word, Lekotek, is a made-up Swedish word that means "play library". Lekotek was created in the 1960s by two Scandinavian parents whose children had disabilities. They wanted their children to live at home and not in residential facilities. They believed all children should be included in their families and communities. And so, they started Lekotek – a family-based program equipped with adapted toys to promote play, learning and inclusion. Today, Lekotek of Georgia's innovative inventory consists of educational materials and "state of the art" computer and iPad technology. In addition to *"including the child with disabilities into their family*", part two of Lekotek's mission statement is *"to include the family into the community"*. That's why our events in the community are so important. Parents are often hesitant to participate in community activities afraid their family will not have a positive experience.
